ACBL Regulations Regarding Bidding Boxes

- ♠ A player is obligated to choose a call before touching any card in the box.
 - Deliberation while touching the bidding box cards or removing bidding cards prior to a call being considered "made" may subject the offending side to the adjustment provisions of Law 16 (Unauthorized Information).
- ▲ A call is considered made when a bidding card is removed from the bidding box and held touching or nearly touching the table or maintained in such a position to indicate that the call has been made. Until a call is considered made, the director will treat the situation as unauthorized information and apply Law 16, After a call is considered made, the director will apply Law 25, Legal and Illegal Changes of Call
 - Directors should use unauthorized information where reasonably appropriate (where they can rule that a bid has not been made). For close cases simply judge that the card had not left the confines of the box; therefore, a call has not been made.
- ▲ A call may be changed without penalty, under the provisions of Law 25, only if a player has inadvertently taken out the wrong bidding box card, and the player corrects, or attempts to correct, without pause for thought, and partner has not subsequently called.
 - The onus is on the player to convince the director that a mechanical irregularity has occurred.
 - If the Director is reasonably certain that the original call was a mechanical problem, they should be liberal in judging pause for thought. It is difficult, however, to justify pulling a bid in place of a pass, double or redouble as a mechanical error.
 - Calls from different pockets should rarely, if at all, be judged as inadvertent. One understandable exception is placing the double card out followed shortly with a bid card that skips the bidding. This appears clear that the double card was placed inadvertently on the table.

Some Bridge Jargon

- ▲ Is it a **Bid** or a **Call**? The Laws of Duplicate Bride makes a distinction between these terms.
 - ▼ A Call is a Bid, Pass, Double, or Redouble.
 - ♦ A **Bid** is a potential contract by stating a denomination or strain (ranking Clubs, Diamonds, Hearts, Spades, or No Trump from the lowest to the highest) and the level (number of tricks to be taken: 1 through 7 after **Book**). In partnership agreements a **Bid** may convey other meanings than a potential contract: sometimes it needs to be **ALERT**ed and other times not. Each subsequent **Bid** names a higher ranking suit and/or level than the previous bid.
 - A **Pass** is a **Call** indicating that the player does not want to name a potential contract or change the previous contract. In partnership agreements a **Pass** may convey other meanings and will need to be **ALERTed**.
 - A **Double** is a **Call** after the last preceding bid by an opponent; no other call than **Pass** may intervene. The meaning is established by the partnership, the position in the call rotation, and previous bids.
 - ♦ A **Redouble** is a **Call** after the last preceding **Double** by an opponent of who made the **Double**, typically by the **Responder**. No other **Call** than **Pass** may intervene.
 - * When there are infractions in the use of **Calls** and **Bids**, the restitution of equity (commonly referred to as penalties) in these situations are different.
- **♦** Who is **Opener**?
 - The **Opener** is the first player to make a **Bid**; only Passes may precede this by other players starting with the Dealer. Dealer makes the first call with either a **Pass** or a **Bid**. If dealer makes a bid, then he is **Opener**.
